



DISCUSSION GUIDE WEEK 2
(April 12th – 18th)

FELLOWSHIP

This four-week vision series for 2026-2028 is titled **KINGDOM CULTURE**. Each week, we will look into four purposes entrusted to the church: to keep preaching Christ (Gospel), keep building community (Fellowship), keep living out Christ's love (Compassion), and keep reaching people far from God (Mission)!

This week, we are diving into diving into part 2 of our series: FELLOWSHIP. The church is a fellowship of believers, meant to be a faith family that fosters love, service, unity, growth and multiplication.

WHAT IS FELLOWSHIP?

Fellowship in Christianity, derived from the Greek *koinonia*, is a deep, spiritual unity among believers centered on their shared life in Jesus Christ. It goes beyond mere socializing, instead, it involves a shared commitment to Christ (our main person in common) seeking to worship Him, provide mutual encouragement in Him, accountability through Him, and practical care in Him. Our common experience of being born again into God's family in Christ makes our fellowship stronger than any forms of human connections: ethnic, linguistic, social.

WELCOME.

WORSHIP. *Good Grace (Hillsong)*

WORD. Read **Acts 2:42-47**

1. Prior to coming to Mosaic, what was your church life like?
2. Pastor Jon shared these sermon points this past weekend:
 - I. **THE DEVOTION OF THE FELLOWSHIP (verse 42)**
 - a. Rooted in the Gospel together
 - b. Bonded as God's family
 - c. Fueled by prayer
 - II. **THE DYNAMICS OF THE FELLOWSHIP (verses 43-46)**
 - a. Culture of awe and wonder
 - b. Culture of joyful generosity
 - c. Culture of radical welcome
 - d. Culture of front seat intimacy
 - III. **THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE FELLOWSHIP (verse 47)**
 - a. Witnessing together
 - b. Growing in numbers together
 - c. Sending workers out

What is your biggest takeaway from the sermon?

3. What was the early church devoted to? How does this passage encourage you? Which specific kingdom culture do we need to grow in?
4. How can our church and our small group better reflect this scene in Acts 2? What are specific obstacles in our culture (technology, shyness, individualism) that hinder this kind of community?
5. What does "all things in common" mean? How does this radical, unselfish generosity (v. 44-45) challenge your modern understanding of possessions and comfort?
6. Growth is a sign of life. Pastor shared some growth goals that we want to see happen at Mosaic. What are some ways this group can contribute to the growth we are praying to see?

WORK. Apply God's Word:

1. Pastor Jon asked: "Are you devoted, or just attending?" What would change your level of devotion dramatically?
2. Every congregation is a local fellowship. Pastor encouraged us to worship, give, serve, grow in our local fellowship. He equated involvement in the local fellowship with home life. Why is devotion to your local fellowship important?
3. How can we grow even more in the area of "radical welcome"?
4. Is our individual generosity reflecting the heart of Jesus?
5. Rate our church and your DGroup (from 1-10) are doing well as place where the Lord can add new people? How can we grow better?
6. Pastor Jon said: "*Envision and imagine the Vic full of people worshipping Jesus. Imagine your DGroup seeing new believers get baptized every season. Let's make heaven crowded!*" Pray for our church's vision is to see our fellowship grow in the following (remember the numbers Pastor shared?): Attendance Growth. DGroups. New Leaders. Church Planting.
